Emotional Conflicts In Dementia Care

Those who are close to someone who has dementia often find it hard to deal with the erratic and difficult behaviours that result from the disease. They may, in fact, begin to interpret these behaviours as intentional ("done on purpose").

This feeling, combined with the stress of caregiving and a lack of understanding of the effects of the disease may cause the caregiver to respond with frustration, impatience, even anger, which often further escalates the cycle of emotional discomfort.

Three caregivers openly share their experiences and frustrations as they interact with their loved one who has dementia. These scenes are integrated with comments and guidance from professionals in the field of dementia care.
